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Peace Corps Response

How to Take Your Peace Corps Story into the Online Video World

Peace Corps Week 2010 is March 1-7. Support the Peace Corps and celebrate throughout the month of March (and all year long) with a third goal activity! Register your participation now at www.peacecorps.gov/thirdgoal/register.

During my service, I found that word-of-mouth was the best way to learn about what was going on in Peace Corps Niger, and in the wider expat and host country national communities I was a part of. It helped me integrate into my Nigerien life to fulfill the first and second goals of the Peace Corps. Now that I am a returned Volunteer, I aim to fulfill the third goal at least once a year—usually during Peace Corps Week—to help other Americans learn about what life is like Niger (pronounced *knee-j-ear*).

This year I wanted to take my approach online by creating a series of three short video presentations on everyday aspects of life in Niger as I experienced them. My first

online presentation, [Home Sweet Home Peace Corps Niger](#), is a little over two minutes long and took two days to put together. It wasn't as difficult as I thought and it sure was fun to relive the memories!

As someone new to amateur video making, I found the process of creating a video presentation for the web similar to putting together a PowerPoint or even preparing for a live presentation. The key is to plan it out and keep it short and sweet as attention spans are fleeting in the online video world. The average video length according to comScore, a global leader in measuring the digital world, is under three minutes.

Here are tips based on my experience on how to create an online presentation video:

Select a topic and related photos. Think about a topic you are comfortable talking about and make sure it reflects positively on your host country. Keep in mind that you will provide a narration of the photos to help your view-

ers learn about your cultural experience. The more photos you have, the more work your project requires. Also, a photo is worth a thousand words so choose wisely.

Organize and digitize your photos. Most of the pictures I took in Niger are in printed photograph format. I had to scan them into digital format. If you are in the same situation, stores in your area with photo processing services may have scanners to digitize your photos onto a disc which you can then load onto your computer. If you have digital photos or a scanner at home, you've already shortened the preparation of your third goal project.

Use a movie maker program. Many computers already come with a movie maker program that is equipped with an easy to follow tutorial. I used Windows Movie Maker for Windows XP. You'll need to import the photos you selected and drag them to the story board in order of preference. You can adjust the length of time the photo



is displayed as well as add fun transition effects from photo to photo. Your presentation will have a polished look if you include an introduction slide and a closing credit slide. Play around with the bells and whistles to jazz up your video, just be careful not to overdo it.

Create a story line. I chose eight photos for my first presentation of my home in my village. I used a sheet of paper and pencil to organize my thoughts on how I wanted to narrate my presentation. I started with a brief introduction, then limited myself to three to six sentences per photo to tell my story, and finished with a credit roll slide, referencing the site I borrowed my map image from. I used the Narrator function of my movie maker program to record myself reading my photo descriptions. Place your own photos in the order that makes the most sense for your story. You can have the photos display for as long as it takes you to narrate them. Go over the whole presentation a few times to complete necessary tweaks and re-recordings until you are happy with your product, then publish it to your computer.

Upload your presentation. There are many video sharing sites on the web to host your online presentation. You will have to become a member in order to up-

load your video and follow their easy instructions to launch your creation. Don't forget to tag your video presentation so it will show up in online searches. I used the following tag words: peace, corps, volunteer, presentation, Niger, development, and home. Once uploaded, you can let the world stumble upon your online presentation or you can promote it on social networking sites such as Facebook or Twitter. Don't forget to forward the link of your online presentation to your contacts who aren't connected to social networks, especially during Peace Corps Week.

The word-of-mouth approach is proven to be the best method of information sharing. Whether we are on the ground as cultural ambassadors for America conducting Peace Corps development projects or in the U.S. as cultural ambassadors on behalf of our host country through third goal activities, it's important to pass on the knowledge we gained as PCVs. Our Peace Corps community can continue to make a difference during Peace Corps Week and throughout the year by breaking stereotypes, sharing cultural commonalities, and highlighting the great things our service taught us from our host country friends and counterparts. Using social media outlets is

another way of getting the word out.
