Education Pays

According to recent government statistics, a person with a master's degree earns almost 21% more than a person with a bachelor's degree. Not only that, just 2.1% of people with a master's degree were unemployed in 2005, compared to 2.6% of those with bachelor's degrees. Even if money and job security don't motivate you, consider the fact that the more responsibility a job entails, the more likely the employer is to require a master's degree. So, regardless of the reason, if you're serious about your career, it's time to think about graduate school.

Peace Corps was thinking about the enormous potential benefits to both RPCVs and their communities when it developed the Fellows/USA program in conjunction with Columbia University's Teachers College more than 20 years ago. Based on Dr. Beryl Levinger's insight that RPCVs have cross-cultural communication skills, and resourcefulness in abundance—very desirable qualities for teachers in under-staffed inner-city schools—Fellows/USA was created. The heart of the program has always been the internship Fellows complete in an

underserved U.S. community while earning their degree.

Master's International (MI), available to both new recruits and RPCVs seeking to serve again, is Fellows/USA's sister program. Conceived as a way to place highly-trained Volunteers in the field, MI combines Peace Corps service with graduate school. While MI offers a wide variety of degrees, it is focused primarily on training Volunteers in hard-to-fill skill areas.

Regardless of which program you choose to enroll in, you'll graduate with substantive experience in your field, in addition to your master's degree. So how do you choose? The two main questions to ask yourself when deciding which program is best suited to your needs are: "Do I want to serve people in a U.S. community or return overseas?" and "How much time am I willing to devote to getting a graduate degree?" When answering these questions there are several variables to consider including responsibilities or commitments that may restrict your options, whether you want to work in the U.S. or overseas after graduation, the experience you already have, and the discipline you want to study.

Fellows/USA is a good option for RPCVs who want to advance their education without giving up their jobs, selling their homes, or saying goodbye to their families. Although it began as a teacher education partnership on the East Coast, the program has expanded across academic disciplines and across the country. Today it encompasses more than 40 universities offering degrees ranging from agricultural economics to urban studies.

Each university incorporates community-based internships into its program. As a Western Illinois University Fellow Christian Tscheschlok (Slovakia 1996-1999) helped a group of community volunteers establish the Rock Falls Community Development Corporation (RFCDC). "The internship is a unique part of the Fellows/USA program. It's really a guided first job that enables rapid transition into a career," explains Christian. "By matching my skill set with the community's needs and supporting me throughout the internship, Fellows/USA eliminated some of the risk inherent in starting a new career." Mak-

ing the transition from school to work was easy for Christian; he has been the RFCDC's executive director since 2001.
