As a senior at Oberlin College, I felt ambivalent about my post-graduate plans. I'd decided to pursue a career in academia, focusing on teaching and research in ecology. At the same time, I wasn't ready to plunge into a Ph.D. program



right away. Instead, I wanted to live abroad, apply my undergraduate education to solving practical problems and, most importantly, contribute to those who had not benefitted from the same privileges I have enjoyed.

I had dreamed of doing Peace Corps service since I was a teenager, but didn't want to put my formal education on hold. Through online research, I came across the University of Washington (UW) School of Environmental and Forest Sciences Peace Corps Master's International (PCMI) program in international forestry. This program offered me everything I wanted: A chance to live abroad, to get real-world experience, and to give of myself. At the same time, I wouldn't have to leave my current professional track and could continue growing intellectually. It seemed the UW PCMI program suited me perfectly and, five years later, I can say that my expectations were realized.

am currently pursuing a

Master's of Public Health at the University of Pennsylvania, while also completing my coursework for a Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary Studies in Human Development. For most RPCVs I know, the time we spent as Peace Corps Volunteers was the most formative, practical, "real world" experience of our lives. Transitioning from life as a Peace Corps Volunteer back to life in the United States can be a challenge. Yet, at least for me, by continuing to be engaged in service projects, by interacting with people similar to those in my old Peace Corps site, by pursuing education, and by working to tackle some of the health and education issues I confronted as a Volunteer, the transition becomes less difficult. Peace Corps Coverdell Fellows provides an important bridge from life as a PCV to a fruitful experience as an RPCV.

I entered the Peace Corps as a water and sanitation Volunteer in El Salvador in 2002. While my technical training included latrine construction and water system design and management, most of my training group ended up focusing on rural health, sanitation, and education. As a Peace Corps Volunteer, I learned the importance of interdisciplinary thinking in the real-world context. Tackling issues of child health and hygiene in the community where I lived required understanding inter-related issues such as education, income, environment, infrastructure, health behaviors, and the social and cultural contexts. The Peace Corps experience has changed the way I approach problems and has fueled my interest in working in the field of child and family health.

times was the charm in his volunteer trajectory. Lewis became interested in volunteering in college, but felt he was not prepared for the Peace Corps. To pick up skills that would make him more competitive, Lewis became an AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps) volunteer. "After I graduated, I was looking for a more structured atmosphere for volunteering," he explains. Through this full-time residential program, Lewis worked on strengthening communities in the greater Denver area.

Still bitten by the volunteer bug, Lewis next served as an AmeriCorps VISTA volunteer in Montana. VISTA, according to Lewis, "requires you to make your own way... You are on your own, and I was working with children who were victims of domestic violence." From this emotionally charged work, Lewis took home the lesson that "one person can have an impact."

After completing VISTA, Lewis felt well prepared for the Peace Corps, and he went on to serve as a water and sanitation Volunteer in Suriname. During this time, he led a countrywide training in project design and management, helping rural people implement their ideas for improving community life by developing income-generating and water and sanitation projects. A die-hard proponent of volunteering, Lewis now works for AmeriCorps NCCC as a selection and placement assistant.
