2012 ANNUAL VOLUNTEER SURVEY GLOBAL REPORT

INTRODUCTION

This report summarizes the results of the 2012 Annual Volunteer Survey (AVS), a key tool the agency utilizes to assess progress towards its goals and identify areas for performance improvement. The survey asked Volunteers to assess:

- the impact of their work
- the effectiveness of their Peace Corps' training
- in-country staff support
- their personal health and safety
- their overall satisfaction with service

For the first time, the AVS was administered as an exclusively web-based survey from June 18 – September 4, 2012. During the eleven weeks the AVS was available online, 6,402 Volunteers made time in their busy schedules to access and complete the survey. With the support and encouragement of their posts, a historically high 87 percent of eligible Volunteers completed the survey.

This report conveys the responses to the survey from Volunteers serving across the world. The results reflect the activities, experiences, and views of Peace Corps Volunteers in 2012, including areas where Volunteers confirm that their needs are being well met and where improvements may be necessary.

ORGANIZATION OF THE REPORT

The global report contains ten sections (labeled A-J), corresponding to the sections used to organize the survey question topics. Volunteers serving since December 2010 or earlier were also asked an additional set of questions about their post-service plans and awareness of the resources available to returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs); their responses are included in an eleventh section (labeled K).

The tabular results are presented in the order in which the questions appeared in the 2012 AVS, which roughly corresponds to the phases of Volunteer service.

The tables show the <u>percent</u> of respondents that selected each choice and the <u>total number</u> of respondents that answered the question. Most survey questions asked respondents to select one answer from a set of choices. The percentages for the "select one" responses add up to 100 percent. Questions that allowed Volunteers to "mark all that apply" result in percentages that total to more than 100 percent. This is because each percentage equals the number of respondents selecting that choice divided by the number of respondents who answered the question.

2012 AVS CHANGES

The most significant change from prior years' surveys was the addition of a separate section on Volunteer health. In addition to previously asked questions about Volunteers' satisfaction with the Peace Corps' health services, stress factors, and ways of coping with stress, new health questions asked about factors limiting Volunteers' ability to maintain their physical health. Another set of new health questions focused on both alcohol use and Peace Corps' alcohol abuse prevention training.

This year's survey also incorporated an expanded set of training topics and activities to reflect Peace Corps' "Focus In Train Up" priorities. Also, new questions focused on Volunteers' connectivity, asking Volunteers about access to the Internet and how long they travel in order to communicate with the post by Internet, text messages, and other types of communication.

Finally, the survey also asked about new types of safety and security training recently implemented by the Peace Corps. Volunteers were asked to describe the most helpful types of Peace Corps training sessions and ways in which they used their in-country training most effectively.

A. Basic Information

This section begins with the overall response rate and number of 2012 AVS submissions from Volunteers eligible to complete the survey.

The 2012 Annual Volunteer Survey response rate globally was 87%.

<u>Theft</u>: taking/attempting to take away your property or cash without involving force or illegal entry, e.g. pick-pocketing.

<u>Stalking</u>: conduct directed at you that causes you to fear for your safety or the safety of others or suffer emotional distress.

Burglary - No assault: unlawful or forcible entry of residence which usually, but not always, involves theft.

<u>Other physical assault</u>: aggressive contact that does not require you to use substantial force to escape and results in no injury or only minor injury.

<u>Other sexual assault</u>: unwanted or forced touching, fondling, groping, or kissing of your breasts, genitals, mouth, buttocks, or anus, or made you touch them.

<u>Burglary with assault</u>: unlawful or forcible entry of residence accompanied by Other Sexual Assault or aggressive contact which results in no injury or only minor injury.

<u>Major physical assault</u>: aggressive contact requiring you to use substantial force to disengage the offender <u>or</u> contact which resulted in major bodily injury, including an injury needing less than two days in hospital, x-rays, or suturing.

<u>Aggravated assault</u>: attack or threat of attack <u>with a weapon</u> in a manner capable of inflicting severe bodily injury or death, or without a weapon when severe bodily injury results.

Robbery: taking or attempting to take anything of value by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting you in fear of immediate harm.

<u>Major sexual assault</u>: forcible removal of your or the offender's clothes, or sexual touching of either you or the offender <u>that included one of the following</u>: use of a weapon, physical injury to you, or your use of substantial force to disengage the offender.

<u>Attempted rape</u>: unsuccessful attempt to force you to have sexual intercourse or perform/receive oral sex, anal sex, or penetration by a finger or object without your consent and/or against your will (including if you were unable to give consent).

Rape: forced sexual intercourse or forcing you to perform/receive oral sex, anal sex, or penetration by a finger or object without your consent and/or against your will (including if you were unable to give consent).
