Third Goal and Puppy Dog Tales

Most Peace Corps Volunteers bring back souvenirs to share, such as baskets, textiles, and photos, as a way of fulfilling the Third Goal. I brought back a dog. After three months at my site in Guatemala, I made a spur of the moment decision to adopt a puppy. I was out in a little village named El Jicaro, giving a talk on the basics of how to start a vegetable garden. While there, I was drawn to a litter of flea-ridden puppies. Their mother, a mangy and emaciated but loveable dog named Shakira, was no longer nursing them, and they now had to fend for themselves. “Take one,” Juana, the dogs’ owner, offered in broken Spanish. My site, Comitancillo, is a Mayan town in the Western Highlands, and Mam is the predominant language spoken. “*Taja jun cheet?*” Juana asked me in Mam. “Do you want a puppy?” I thought about it for a minute, wondering how I would get it home—I had ridden my bicycle there. “No problem,” she said, as she handed me a woven plastic grain bag called a *costal*. “Just pick a puppy and

put it in this bag, and you can sling it over your shoulder as you ride your bike.” I couldn’t argue with that logic, so I went ahead and picked a puppy with the markings of a Doberman with white socks and an extra toe on each of his back paws. He was hiding in the *chuj*, an adobe Mayan sauna, which the people use to bathe in once a week. I stuck him in the bag, and proclaimed in Mam—I practiced every chance I got—“*At wey jun t’man cheet.*” “Here I have one male puppy.” I paid 18 quetzales for him, the equivalent of about two and a half dollars, and together we rode the three miles back to my house.

Over the subsequent two years, my dog, Casey Jones, proved to be an important part of my Peace Corps service. He came with me just about everywhere I went, and helped me demonstrate firsthand the benefits of improved nutrition. People in Comitancillo had a hard time believing that my big, strong, and healthy dog was “*puro Comiteco*”. All of Casey’s brothers were half his size. I fed him Kibble, which

few people in Comitancillo could afford. However, I took the opportunity to draw parallels between the nutrition found in the ingredients of Casey’s balanced diet and the vegetables and eggs the towns’ people could produce for their families in their backyards. Many in Comitancillo, human and canine alike, subsist largely on a tortilla and tamale diet. Chronic malnutrition is especially problematic. Casey was a living example of the effects of improved nutrition. It was also an eye-opener for Comitecos to see how Americans tend to interact with their dogs. For the most part, dogs in Comitancillo aren’t seen as pets, but rather are just meant to guard the house.

Casey and I have been living in the U.S. for three years now. He continues to be a great Peace Corps helper, this time with fulfilling the Third Goal. We live in dog-friendly San Francisco, and people often ask me what kind of dog he is. I usually say he’s a “Guatemalan *chuch*” which translates to “Guatemalan mutt”. This tends to pique their interest,

and prompts them to ask questions about Guatemala.

A year after I closed my Peace Corps service, I decided to enroll Casey in a course to become an American Kennel Club certified therapy dog. I was looking for an opportunity to volunteer with Casey, and with his help, share my Peace Corps experience in Guatemala with others. Twice a month, for two hours at a time, Casey and I visit an after-school program at the Boys and Girls Club in San Francisco's Tenderloin neighborhood. Kids read books to him as part of the Puppy Dog Tales program, sponsored by the San Francisco Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SF/SPCA). The children, many of them from Latin America and learning English as a second language, truly become at ease around Casey, and are able to finish reading books as he listens patiently. Each child reads for about twenty minutes. Usually

there's time for six children to have a private reading session with him if they sign up ahead of time (the list always fills up fast). The kids are excited to learn more about Casey's Guatemalan heritage. Seizing on the kids' newfound enthusiasm for Guatemala, the SF/SPCA's Puppy Dog Tales director offered to purchase a number of Guatemalan-themed children's books for the program, which have been a huge hit.

I feel fortunate to have found such a meaningful way of fulfilling the Third Goal with my Guatemalan dog. But you don't need a Peace Corps dog in order to do this. I encourage all returned Volunteers to find ways of keeping your Peace Corps experience alive by making the extra effort to do some community service at home, especially during the Peace Corps' 50th anniversary year in 2011. The Third Goal is about helping Americans understand the people and cultures of other countries, and this

is a great thing to do. More than sharing stories of service, RPCVs can continue the spirit of service in our communities here. As John F. Kennedy said, "The logic of the Peace Corps is that someday we are going to bring it home to America" (although I don't think he had dogs in mind when he said that). The beauty of Peace Corps is that you have two years of uninterrupted time to try to help other people, and learn from them. That spirit, more than anything, is what we should be sharing with people at home through the Third Goal and through community service.
