For the first time ever, each Peace Corps position will have clear *Apply By* and *Know By* deadlines. Top Tips for Making an Impact

- Pick the platform that works for you. There are many ways to share this information, from social media to letters to the editor. All will make a difference.
- **Don't wait.** Share this news as soon as you can.
- Speak plainly. Try not to use Peace Corps acronyms or jargon.
- Pictures are worth a thousand words. Use images wherever possible.
- **Grammar matters.** Give your writing a second look before hitting send.
- Make it your own. Sharing your personal story will connect best with your audience.

I work regularly with young people who want to find a way to make a difference. One thing I often recommend is the opportunity to live and work in a community abroad with the Peace Corps. This summer, the Peace Corps announced dramatic changes to its application to make the process faster, simpler, and more transparent. Applicants can go online and browse job listings in more than 65 countries around the world, including jobs such as helping farmers in Ghana use GPS to increase crop production and starting camps to empower girls and young women in Peru. These opportunities can help the young people I work with meet their personal and professional goals, and set them up for a lifetime of success and service. The new Peace Corps application process is easier than ever, and that's a good thing for my students.

Write an Opinion Editorial

Opinion editorials, usually known as op-eds, are newspaper columns that express the viewpoint of the author. Learn more about op-eds <u>here</u>. Top tips for a successful op-ed include:

- Take a stand: Op-eds are designed to express an opinion, such as why it's important to serve.
- *Keep it brief:* Stick to the word lengths provided by editors. In general, newspaper op-eds run between 600–800 words.
- *Use examples:* Anecdotes and personal stories are persuasive tools. They help explain and bring issues to life.
- Make a specific recommendation: State your opinion, provide examples based on experience, and
 make a recommendation. In this case, you can encourage readers to learn more about the
 Peace Corps today and apply to serve.
- Draw the reader in: Your first paragraph should draw in the reader by using a dramatic vignette or a well-stated argument. End with a bang. Your final paragraph is as important as your opening paragraph.

The best way to submit your op-ed is almost always via email. Most newspapers print their contact information on their opinion or editorial pages. Otherwise, visit your newspaper's website and look in the "Contact Us" section. Here are some ideas to help you get started. Don't forget to make it your own!
