Today, Peace Corps remains committed to promoting world peace and friendship by pursuing **three goals**:

- To help the people of interested countries in meeting their need for trained men and women;
- 2. To help promote a better understanding of Americans on the part of the peoples served:
- 3. To help promote a better understanding of other peoples on the part of Americans.

Since October 1961, over 9,300 Volunteers have worked alongside requesting host communities, in sectors including agriculture, forestry, fisheries, small business, technology, health, solid waste management, and disaster risk management.

At present, Peace Corps Volunteers serve for two years in one of three priority sectors: (1) Children, Youth and Family, (2) Coastal Resource Management, and (3) Education. Alternatively, shorter-term service is available for Response Volunteers and Virtual Service Pilot Participants.

Children, Youth, and Family

Children, Youth, and Family (CYF) Volunteers work with the vulnerable segments of Philippine society, focusing on atrisk youth, children with disabilities, children in conflict with the law, and survivors of abuse and neglect, and people living with HIV/AIDS.

2024 Highlights

Youth Volunteer Service Initiative (VSI) Success: Trained peer educators expanded their reach with support from local governments and grants, focusing on mental health, adolescent sexual reproductive health, and HIV. VSI is recognized as a best practice for Host Country Volunteerism.



Youth Volunteerism Workshop: Led by CYF Batch 279, the workshop in August prepared 120 participants to scale up the VSI. The workshop focused on HIV, supported by the Peace Corps Office of Global Health and HIV.

Philippine Volunteer Service Program Development: In collaboration with the Philippine National Volunteer Service Coordinating Agency, CYF gathered 60 representatives from various stakeholders in November to develop a Philippine Volunteer Service Program.

In 2024, Children, Youth, and Family Volunteer, Frankie, assisted Negrosanon Young Leaders Institute to support youth development in Negros Occidental. Through Project YES (Youth Employment and Success), Frankie helped facilitate workshops and assistance desks in job fairs that improved employability and financial literacy for young people, reaching 250 participants. At these events, their team provided free services, including resume building, photo sessions, and printing, to 63 young people, with


some of them securing employment on the spot. Additionally, Frankie took part in the Negrosanon Young Leaders Summit 2024, where 44 youth community leaders gained insights into advocacy, leadership, and project planning. These youth leaders were able to plan projects that will be implemented in their respective communities. Frankie is proud to be working with an organization that nurtures hope and encourages sustainable growth in the communities.

Coastal Resource Management

Coastal Resource Management (CRM) Volunteers collaborate with local government units and non-governmental organizations to assist communities and individuals in managing coastal resources. They help promote sustainable, healthy, and productive environmental practices.

2024 Highlights

In June, the Peace Corps and U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) hosted a workshop in Puerto Galera, Oriental Mindoro, to strengthen marine protected area (MPA) management. Sixty participants, including Peace Corps Volunteers, local government officials, and fisherfolk leaders, engaged in sessions on legal frameworks, ecosystem-based fisheries management, biodiversity assessment tools, and sustainable funding strategies. The workshop emphasized practical skills, citizen science, and community collaboration, with participants developing work plans to enhance MPA conservation efforts.





In December, the Peace Corps and USAID hosted a second workshop on Marine Protected Area (MPA) management in Puerto Galera, Oriental Mindoro, bringing together 82 participants from 24 communities. This workshop focused on best practices, biodiversity monitoring, and sustainable strategies for interconnected MPAs. Participants engaged in knowledge exchange and field visits, highlighting local successes like Oriental Mindoro's "STAR MPA Awards" and Puerto Galera's environmental initiatives, emphasizing the balance between marine conservation and economic growth.

Helping Communities Through Coastal Conservation







In April and May, Alex worked with the Talisay City Environment and Natural Resources Office and Coastal Conservation and Education Foundation to conduct biophysical assessments of mangroves and corals. This data informs critical documents like the Coastal Environmental Profile and MPA Management Plan. Through a Special Project Assistance (SPA) grant, Alex facilitated workshops presenting these findings to local stakeholders, addressing key concerns and fostering optimism for future CRM efforts.

Rachel, alongside the Tubigon Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office, developed the Y-CRM (Youth Coastal Resource Monitoring) Team Internship, engaging 16 environmental science students in a 200-hour on-the-job training program. The internship, supported by a SPA grant, included habitat assessments, community outreach, and professional development workshops. Rachel is confident these young professionals will significantly contribute to protecting marine resources in their communities

To combat beach erosion and enhance wildlife habitats, Tim initiated a project to plant trees along Botolan's beaches, addressing the loss of trees due to housing and hotel development.


In August, he presented this plan to the Botolan Resort Association, resulting in 14 resort owners joining the initiative. The project includes tree species like coconuts, Talisay, and Bitaog, which will not only prevent erosion but also make the area more attractive for tourists.

Education

Education (EDU) Volunteers work in public elementary and high schools to enhance students' English communication skills for academic and professional opportunities. They co-plan and co-teach with Filipino teachers, conduct remedial reading and tutorial sessions, help organize and facilitate training seminars for teachers, improve library resources, and implement projects to support learning.

2024 Highlights

In 2024, the Education sector reopened its old sites and developed new ones in the provinces of Aklan, Batangas, and Bohol, marking another milestone for Peace Corps Philippines, as we continue to rebuild and rekindle partnerships after the pandemic.

The Volunteers and their work partners are the heart and soul of the PC education program. They show up in a variety of ways for their students to ensure that their learning remains a priority. Over the past year, EDU Volunteers have been developing libraries, literacy learning hubs, school-based remedial reading programs, and organizing capacity-building workshops for their immediate school community members.




with an exciting and eager school."

Response

Peace Corps Response Volunteers (PCRVs) have higher technical expertise and work with more specialized, short-term, seven-month assignments requested by partner organizations to help increase and sustain organizational competency with diverse capacity-building activities.

2024 Highlights

A total of nine (9) PCRVs served in 2024 for the following program priorities: weather adaptation, disaster risk reduction, youth in development, education, and environment. The partner organizations that have hosted them include national and local government agencies, state universities, and a non-governmental agency.

Virtual Service Pilot

The Virtual Service Pilot (VSP) is an innovative service model launched in 2020 to expand opportunities for Peace Corps engagement through online engagement. Participants in the VSP are U.S. private citizens who donate between 5 and 15 hours per week of their time and expertise both synchronously and asynchronously for an average of sixmonth virtual assignments that can be completed remotely with partner organizations.



A total of three (3) VSP Participants have engaged in virtual technical support with the three universities in Mindanao on the priority program areas of environmental resilience and disaster risk management.

On VSP Participant Sonam: "As an environmental science expert, Ms. Sonam brought her expertise to the forefront by assisting in the development of a civic education module on [weather adaptation and disaster risk reduction], specifically tailored for the Islamic schools (madaris) in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM). With BARMM experiencing more frequent severe typhoons and persistent flooding, Ms. Sonam's role was pivotal. Despite the time difference and the constraints of serving online, she seamlessly collaborated with the stakeholders. Her virtual service included sharing best practices for sustainable development, conducting needs assessments, and designing educational content on [extreme weather events to equip madaris teachers with tools to foster environmental awareness. The module she developed integrates effectively into classroom settings, addressing critical issues like plastic waste burning and improper waste management, while promoting a culture of sustainability among young learners."
