


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Peace Corps ANNUAL REPORT






In September 2020, 15 YD counterparts (all youth service providers) and 14 PCU staff members participated in this 13.5 hour-long training.



Peace Corps Ukraine supports financial literacy, one of the Ukrainian Government's priorities!

8 PCU staff members and 7 YD counterparts participated in the online training on Positive Youth Development (PYD) organized by the Support to Anti-Corruption Champion Institutions in Ukraine (SACCI) Project.

During the pandemic, PCU staff and YD counterparts participated in skill-building trainings conducted by USAID partners: SACCI implemented by Management Systems International and USAID Financial Sector Transformation Project implemented by DAI Global LLC.



USAID's SPA supported Financial Literacy, Civic Education and Life Skills training for 35 Youth Service Providers, mostly women.

The topics were: Positive Youth
Development, Financial Literacy,
Civic Engagement of Youth,
Volunteerism, Life Skills and
Emotional Intelligence.


