



Peace Corps Volunteers provide technical assistance to countries that have requested it in a wide variety of Volunteer positions throughout the world. All Volunteers serve in six general work areas: Agriculture, Community Economic Development, Education, Environment, Health, and Youth in Development.

Search for currently available opportunities at peacecorps.gov/openings. Each posted opportunity includes apply by and departure dates. We recommend that you submit your application as early as possible: The sooner you apply, the sooner you could be invited to be a Peace Corps Volunteer.

Environment Volunteers

Environmental damage can have enormous consequences to a community's livelihood. Peace Corps Volunteers strengthen communities' understanding of environmental issues, providing people with the knowledge to develop their own programs and make their own choices about how to best protect and preserve the local environment.

Programs and Sample Projects

Environmental Education and Awareness

- Teach environmental education in elementary and secondary schools and promote environmental awareness to groups and individuals outside school settings
- Assist environmental groups and nongovernmental organizations in management and development
- Promote sustainable use of natural resources
- Teach soil conservation, forestry, and vegetable gardening practices

Forestry

- Establish forest conservation plans and develop alternatives to wood as a fuel source
- Work on soil conservation and reforestation projects
- Improve agroforestry practices, such as fruit production
- Preserve biodiversity near national parks or other reserves
- Work on watershed management and flood control projects

Protected Areas Management

- Conduct community-based conservation, such as sustainable use of forest or marine resources
- Promote ecotourism and other income-generating activities for communities living near protected areas
- Oversee technical training of park managers
